RDPFFA ENDORSES PLAN OF ADJUSTMENT

The letter below is being sent to all retirees

April 29, 2014

Dear City of Detroit Police and Fire Fighter Retirees:

The Retired Detroit Police and Fire Fighters Association ("RDPFFA") is writing to you in connection with the Plan of Adjustment as amended and filed by the City of Detroit on April 26, 2014 (the Plan). The Board of Directors of the RDPF-FA unanimously recommends that you vote in favor of the Plan on the ballots that you are receiving along with this letter.

This recommendation comes after the RDPFFA took a leadership role in negotiations with the City regarding pension and other post-employment benefit (primarily health care) ("OPEB") treatment of the claims of police and fire fighter retirees. Specifically, those long and hard-fought negotiations resulted in the RDPFFA Board of Directors voting to unanimously approve an agreement in principal with the City on April 15, 2014. On April 25, 2014 the material terms of that agreement were incorporated into an executed Term Sheet. Those terms have now been included in the Plan.

Under the current financial conditions of the City of Detroit and with the limited revenue income streams that are currently available to the City, the results contained within the executed Term Sheet are the best protection of our pension and other benefits that could be obtained. The treatment of police and fire fighter retirees has improved significantly since the onset of the bankruptcy and is materially better if classes 10 and 11 approve the Plan.



Here we are waiting for more updated information to make available to everyone concerning the bankruptcy and the City gets another extension on filling their Plan of Adjustment (POA). As of this writing the Association is still waiting for the final wording on the section of the POA that involves our class in the bankruptcy proceedings. It appears that the City was granted an extension to May 12, 2014 to send out the ballots with a return date of July 14, 2014, but there is always the chance that will change again. Regardless there seems to be more than enough time for the Association Attorneys and legal team to give the final review. We just ask that you keep updated as much as possible either with the hotline or e-mail. As soon as important information is received we will make every attempt to keep you informed.

By the time this issue reaches you the May general meeting will be over and our attention will be directed to the **Annual Picnic** and **June General Meeting** in Frankenmuth, MI. 

Mainly, police and fire personnel did their jobs, followed the rules and left the policymaking to the elected city administrators. We received negotiated benefits commonly and officially recognized as a "Contract", guarantees signed and sealed for work performed and the expectation was that these agreements would be time-honored.

Our members had been witnessing Detroit's decline for years and it is hard to believe that there have been no checks and balances in place. Detroit ultimately reached its distressed city status, Bankruptcy followed and our office became inundated with thousands of phone calls. We established a "Hot Line (888) 596-2508 to assist members. RDPFFA members and Associates were concerned, confused, frustrated along



with other related adjectives regarding the loss or reduction in benefits. The City complicated matters unbeknown to retirees by contracting a company from Illinois for Healthcare Open Enrollment and secondly contracting a company out of Washington State to issue stipend checks. The Benefits Administration Human Resources phone banks were usually full.

The mailings and paper continued with a document filed 03/06/14 — titled - Second Amended Order Establishing Procedures, Deadlines and **Hearing dates relating to the Debtor's Plan of Adjustment** - In part, "The City has filed a plan of adjustment and a proposed disclosure statement. To promote the just, speedy, and inexpensive determination of this case as required by Fed. R. Bankr. P. 1001, the Court herby established the procedures, deadlines and hearing dates set forth below". - (Take note of a few words "just, speedy, and **inexpensive** determination)

Words mean something and the Michigan Constitution was worth looking at because of the following section, "State Constitution (Excerpt) Constitution of Michigan of 1963

24 - Public pension plans and retirement systems, obligation.

Sec.24. The accrued financial benefits of each pension plan and retirement system of the state and its political subdivision shall be a contractual obligation thereof which shall not be diminished or impaired thereby.

Financial benefits arising on account of service rendered in each fiscal year shall be funded during that year and such funding shall not be used for financing unfunded accrued liabilities. - (Focus on the underlined)

Continuing with words meaning something, It is noticeable that City representatives make a deliberate attempt to avoid using "Contract" or "Obligation", by constantly substituting "unable to keep our promise" which softens the impact to readers or listeners by not using the correct terms of "Contract" or "Obligation". A final point, it is ironic that authorization has been given to spend millions of city dollars for administrative, attorney and accountant fees for finding the fairest way to cut pensioners earned benefits."

Like so many who have called our office over the last few months it is my turn to vent!

The RDPFFA has reached an agreement with the City of Detroit regarding the City's Bankruptcy "Plan of Adjustment (POA) there is a lot of moving parts to this agreement and the struggle to protect our benefits will continue. The following are the main issues contained within the agreement:

- 1. Current Retirees will continue to receive the full amount of their current pensions.
- 2. Current retirees will receive in aggregate value to 45% of the value of future COLA, this includes those under Old System, increases are dependent on Actives increases.
- 3. There is a variable restoration program which could restore COLA benefits to 100%, current retirees, those retired as of June 30, 2014 will be the first to have their benefits restored until the value reaches 66% of the previous benefits level.
- 4. There will be a separate Healthcare VEBA for Police & Fire Retirees; the RDPFFA will be able to appoint Board Members.
- 5. Police & Fire Retirees will continue to have voting representation of the Pension Board.

Some of the details of these agreements are still being worked out. You will find these Terms listed in the City's Plan of Adjustment. Some of the items require implementation of other agreements, such as what has become known as the "Grand Bargain" donations of approximately 816 million dollars. Part of the Grand Bargain requires State legislation, for the State to provide 350 million to help cover pensions. We are working with our lobbyist and others to push this legislation. We are making progress, but this is far from over. Also, Judge Rhodes ordered that the ballots reflect, that if money from outside sources is not received, or State Legislation is not passed, and you have voted in support of the Plan, your vote will be changed from a Yes Vote to a No Vote, to ensure that you do not vote for something and then receive something different.

The RDPFFA will provide a letter of endorsement of the City's Plan of Adjustment, which will be included in the package of information you will receive with your Ballot for you to vote on the Plan. The RDPFFA is recommending that you support the Plan of Adjustment. Voting is scheduled to start on May 12 and run to July 11, 2014. We will continue to have new information available on the RDPFFA HOTLINE. You should call regularly for updates to **(888) 596-2508**.

I have pointed out from the beginning that this was going to be a very long and expensive fight. Currently the Association has our main Legal Firm of Lippitt, O'Keefe, Bankruptcy Firm of Silverman & Morris, and the financial advisory firm of Amherst Partners all working for the RDPFFA on this Bankruptcy case. We are also working with our Lobbyist and others in Lansing on the Legislation. I want to express my sincere appreciation for our members that have donated over \$176,000 dollars towards our efforts, but as of this date the costs have reached just over \$400,000.00. Still facing months of legal maneuvering and further Mediation along with our Legislative efforts, I believe it is likely we will more than double our current cost. If the Grand Bargain doses not materialize, we may very likely then end up facing years of legal battles through the court systems. This battle would require at least one trip to the US Supreme Court and maybe two.

To keep up this fight on all levels I am once again asking of those that have the resources to contribute what you can. I know these are difficult times, but we are in the fight of our lives. We need everyone's assistance to continue our efforts at the current level.

This copy of the Unity is being mailed to all retired Police and Fire Fighters. If you currently are not a member I hope you will take a minute to consider what has been taking place and the value of your benefits that are at risk. You also will notice that not only are the members paying to finance this effort to protect all retirees' benefits with their dues, but hundreds are going the extra mile with regular financial donations. Everyone's benefits are at risk, and we should all do our part. Membership dues are only \$36.00 per year and can be paid on an annual basis or deducted from your pension check (\$3 monthly). 



FIRE IN THE HOLE: LESSON LEARNED

I dodged a potential big loss last month. Anne, my wife, and I have a nice house and a very nice kitchen. Anne is a gourmet chef, so we have really good (and expensive) appliances. One fateful morning one of our appliances went rogue. The control panel in the stove shorted out and the stove burst into flames. Once a month we have cleaning ladies come in and, luckily for us, they were at the house and they're tough. One hit the circuit breaker and the other called 911 and ran across the street to get my neighbor, who is a firefighter. The fire was extinguished leaving behind one ruined, expensive stove and some burn marks on the floor. We just finished the clean up this weekend.

We dodged the bullet, but it got me thinking about a lot of things, such as what if the cleaning ladies hadn't been there, or if we had been sleeping, or so many other possibilities. Then I realized that I'm a personal finance whiz with some missing ingredients. Had my house burned down, I did have replacement insurance on the contents, but didn't really have a record of the contents. I have a whole bunch of pin numbers on my account, but not a way to get those to my wife. I have insurance, but I haven't shopped it for quite a while.

This was annoying, so I sat down with the programs I wrote years ago and built some useful checklists; simple lists, but things we all should be doing. We refined it and sampled it with some clients, and got a shocking 100% positive response. It seems that most of us, no matter how organized we are, want to get our affairs in order and have some peace of mind. I noticed something else: I have a scarcity of time, so getting these things done liberates some time and brain space.

What kinds of things are on the checklists? Well, the first and foremost is to make a visual inventory of the contents of your home. Use one of your snazzy electronic devices, a camera or video recorder, and make a timely picture record. Put something in the photos (e.g. Time magazine) that dates the picture. Store the picture in a safe place. What about your wallet? Make a copy of the contents of your wallet (not the money, that's illegal), and have that in a safe place. Do the same with your pin numbers and account numbers in your digital legacy.

There's more, a lot more. Have you told your agent on your power of attorney about the POA? Have you talked to the guardian in your will? Did you put a guardian in your power of attorney? Are you using auto-bill pay to speed up your cash flow? Can you benefit from some kind of account aggregation? This is where you can look at all of your accounts in one place at one time, like a dashboard.

All in all, we came up with almost 60 ideas of some simple, but important things that you can do. Of course, not all apply to everyone, but the basic principle is simple: a good financial life has a lot of pieces that are just common sense things that we should do.

Living without a stove for a couple of months was troublesome: I can't wait to make some omelets. On the other hand, I think about what might have happened and respect the wakeup call.
